

AsiaPacific-FishWatch project



- An Asian Fisheries Society online project
 - ... explain about Asia-Pacific fish products eaten locally and in major world markets
 - ... provide authoritative, accessible information for consumers, the general public, fish exporters and importers, fisheries managers, aquaculturists, fishers and scientists
 - Originally aimed primarily at "consumers"
 - But a first stage is to get to the concerned public (more detailed than originally planned)
 - Consumer information is a step further along at this stage (more derived, simpler and less detailed)
 - NOAA's FishWatch has reached this stage

AsiaPacific-FishWatch project




- Other fisheries information systems relevant to Asia-Pacific do not fill this niche
 - E.g., FishSource, FAO FIRMS, etc
 - FishWiki is a new network among programs, including ours


AsiaPacific-FishWatch project



- Asia and western Pacific regions
- Initial priority on edible species
 - aquaculture and fisheries
- About 100 species/groups in 1st phase (1/3 of world fish)
- Criteria include
 - >100,000 t production
 - high value
 - at least top 3 producing countries



The four canned tuna species




- Grant from the International Seafood Sustainability Foundation
- For four main canned tuna species
 - Skipjack (Katsuwonus pelamis)
 - Yellowfin (Thunnus albacares)
 - Bigeye (Thunnus obesus)
 - Albacore (Thunnus alulunga)
- W & C Pacific and Indian oceans
- All four now in near final stage of information collection and review
 - Skipjack as first candidate for completion




Skipjack – a political species



- In top 10 aquatic species (world, Asia-Pacific)
- Largest production is from Asia-Pacific
- National, international fleets, markets
- 2 RFMOs
 - W&C Pacific Fisheries Commission
 - Indian Ocean Tuna Commission
- Conservationists very interested
 - anti-FADs, pro-pole & line certification campaigns

AsiaPacific-FishWatch presentation is sensitive

Skipjack - information



- Who has it
 - RFMO scientists, their regular consultants
 - Conservation NGOs keen to get it
 - Most national agencies have rather limited info
 - Emerging UN social agencies, welfare NGOs interest
- What is and isn't available
 - Reasonable amount on fish stock assessment, biology, biogeography, climate links
 - Social, gender, economic, labour, post-harvest information sparse and reports mainly negative
 - Sensitive for fishing and carrier fleets, factories and retailers

Skipjack - re-structuring

- "No plan survives contact with the enemy"
 - Original structure was modified in developing the skipjack presentation
 - Retained the main structure >>
- Need to complete an aquaculture species to further test structure




- Full text reviewed by contributors, edits consequently made
- Social and labour sections most sensitive
- Experts find it well structured and useful
- Ready for release

Putting it onto the web

- Permissions for all graphics, including maps, in final stage of clearance
